# Steamer *Kate* Explosion: Correlating Indirect Evidence to Identify and Correct an Error

What happens when the indirect evidence of a death and a probate record don't agree? The research begins in earnest! That's what happened in the case of the death of Antoine/Anthony Lallament of Mobile, Alabama. When did he actually die? Which record is correct? What would other available records reveal? This case study provides the research methodology involved in solving this problem.

# Create a Genealogy Research Plan

- A. Define and state the problem or the objective.
- B. Review, in detail, what you know about the research problem.
  - a. Assemble all the data/documents (on that ancestor) that you already have.
- C. Analyze the data/documents that you have.
  - a. Look at your research documentation objectively (without preconceived ideas).
  - b. Re-evaluate what you know.
    - 1. Separate your information from your conclusions.
  - c. Judge the evidence reliability.
    - 1. Original, derivative, or authored narrative source?
    - 2. Primary, secondary, or undetermined information (knowledge of the informant)?
    - 3. Direct, indirect or negative evidence to the problem?
- D. Create or Update your files.
  - a. Create or update the data in your family tree program.
  - b. Create or update the source citations for your facts.
  - c. Create or update your Research Log.
  - d. Create or update your Timeline.
  - e. Create or update your locality search.
- E. Create a list of the action items needed with the resources to review and the repositories to visit to eliminate any weaknesses and gaps in your previous research.
- F. Execute your research plan.
- G. Evaluate your results; draw your conclusions; and make a report.

#### **Analyze Your Data/Documents**

Pull every piece of documentation about your "problem" ancestor from your files. It doesn't matter what the record is, pull it out so that you can take a closer look at it. The sources we use can sometimes tell us more then we think. We need to look at them – from upper left corner, to bottom right corner and every word in between. Look at it objectively – with new eyes, without preconceived ideas. Toss out all of your previous thought about the record. Now, using what you know about source types, information, and evidence reanalyze your documents.

#### Place Your Ancestor on a Timeline.

A timeline is a visual representation of events within a particular time in which your ancestor's life events are compiled into strict chronological order within the type of timeline chosen. There are many types of timelines - Family, Church, Geographic Area, History (U.S. & World), Military, Science, Social, Sports, Disasters, etc. Timelines can also be used to help you analyze a genealogy problem or brick wall by inserting the information on all of the records and resources you have researched.

### **Create a Locality Search**

A locality search is a search for the records of the place and time your ancestor lived and the repositories that hold those records. Look for information on the date the state, county, city, or town was formed. What is its parent county or counties and boundary changes? Look for the start date for birth, marriage, death, land, probate, tax records, etc. Look for information about maps, census records, manuscript collections, newspapers, migration trails, and more. Add in the addresses and contact information for the state archives, state/county/city vital records department, county clerk, local public library, courthouse, and genealogical society(ies). Check for years of record loss – and whatever is appropriate for your area of research and time period.
